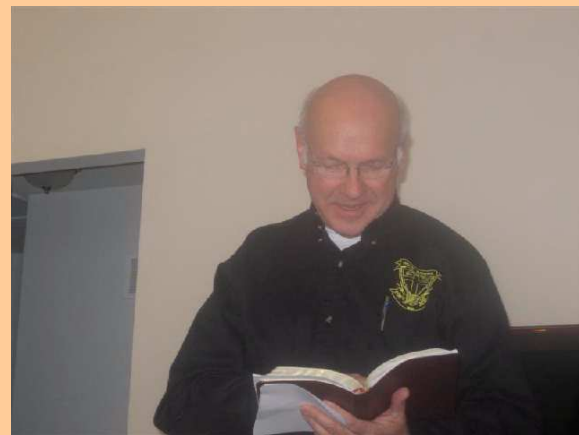
Chaplain's Corner

Safety Tip of the Month: Why Go High-Visual

Ask any rider, and they will probably tell you their biggest safety concern is being cut off, run over, or otherwise violated by another driver in traffic. It's a constant, serious threat.

However, as a rider, you can take control of the situation by making yourself as highly visible (conspicuous) as possible. Doing so will reduce the number of surprises you face every day and help you avoid getting blindsided by someone else's last-minute decision.

- Most car drivers aren't familiar with motorcycles, so they don't think to look for them in traffic.
- Motorcycle riders typically wear dark colors and can easily blend into the background and "disappear."
- Motorcycles are smaller than other vehicles, so they are more difficult to spot in traffic and can be hidden by other vehicles or roadside features.
- Daytime headlight use does not give motorcycle riders much of an advantage anymore, due to the widespread use of daytime running lights on cars.
- The smaller size and single headlight on the motorcycle makes it more difficult for other drivers to judge a rider's speed and distance.

However, as a rider, you can take control of the situation by making yourself as **highly visible** (conspicuous) as possible. Doing so will reduce the number of surprises you face every day and help you avoid getting blindsided by someone else's last-minute decision.

Spring Dreaming

Warm weather came upon us suddenly in February and like most motorcyclists my V-Twin heart started a poundin'. Late in the morning I opened the garage door to some warm sunshine. Perfect! I moved some things aside, moved the motorcycle to the middle of the garage and got my tools out. My Honda Aero 1100 needs a new muffler and this seemed like a perfect time to do it. I like that name, Aero. Kinda fitting for a pilot.

When I bought the bike it had a stock muffler with no baffle in it. The owner had literally ripped it out of the muffler, to the point I couldn't even put a new baffle in it. This of course made the bike quite loud. Now I like a good sounding loud motorcycle as well as the next guy, but this Honda was loud like a ship's horn leaving and entering port. Made dogs bark, babies cry and old ladies shake their canes at me. Now being a good neighbor and a man who likes his subdivision very much, I decided to make my ride a little more neighborhood friendly. So last fall I scouted out new mufflers. Aftermarket mufflers were in a word, expensive. Expensive, that's a relative word, but in my bank account \$500 counts as *expensive*. Even a stock muffler was as expensive as the custom ones. I searched Craig's List and E-Bay for a couple of months and finally one day I found a stock 1998 Honda Aero muffler for sale. So a hundred bucks and one UPS delivery later, I had my muffler. I cleaned it, painted the pipes and shined the chrome till the "new" muffler shined like new. Then I stuck it under the Christmas tree, slapped a bow on it and called it a present from my wife. Saved her a Christmas present purchase, she's happy, I'm happy, worked out all around, know what I mean?

So as I was saying, I opened the garage door and let things warm up some in the sunshine. How hard could this be? Got out my tools and started taking off the old muffler. Those old nuts were kinda tight so I gave them a good spray with WD40 and they came right off. These two for sure, and probably these two as well, just for good measure. Hmm, jiggle and wiggle, but she wouldn't budge. Look around some more, oh right, the clamps on the ends of the two pipes. Undo those (Ouch! Where's that blood from? Who designed this thing?), and don't forget the hook bracket. Dang, where'd that nut roll off to? OK, put a piece of 2x4 against it and tap with a big ball peen hammer. Off she comes, nice as can be! Sweet! I'll be done by lunch time. Now where did that socket roll off to?

I pick up the new muffler and slide it in place. Hmm. Something somewhere is holding things up. Wiggle, jiggle, push, pull, nothing. I look closely at the pipe ends. Looks like the insulation is hanging up. I smooth it down, try again. And again. That WD40 sure made the floor slippery. I look at it every which way and see the clamp is in the way. Move the clamp, wiggle and jiggle, she finally on. I put in the rear two bolts and move to the pipe ends. I notice that one clamp is missing. I look over at the old muffler from my twisted upside down position on the concrete floor. There it is, on the old muffler. Dang it! I take the screws out and pull the new pipe off, put the clamp on and slip it back in place. Push, shove, up, down, check the insulation, try again. And again. And again. Finally it goes on. I find the rear screws, put them in and check the front pipe ends. Crimminy, they're only in about a quarter of an inch! How the heck is a clamp supposed to hold that?! I go inside and grab a late lunch, enjoying the taste of peanut butter, jelly, rust, dirt and greasy grime. The Mechanic's piece de' resistance!

I take a break from the muffler debacle and clean up the battery box, scraping it nice and clean, then shooting some gloss black engine paint onto it. I let that dry while I go back to the muffler.

I yank on the pipe ends for a while and manage to work them into about an inch of overlap. I get one clamp on, but the other just won't go. I wiggle it, jiggle it, bang on it, curse a little bit. I finally figure out it has to be on the muffler side before it goes on. Never went like this on American Chopper. So I undo all the bolts, pull the muffler back off, put the clamps on the muffler end, then slide it back on with a lot of twisting and turning and banging and a little more cursing. I get the screws in, work the pipes into a one inch overlap again, get the clamps on, do some careful hammering on the support bracket because it has to be *just so* before it'll hook on the latch *and* line up with the screw hole. Sigh. Finally though, it was on and tight. I step back, kicking some left over washers across the floor and admire my work. I run down to the basement and grab the battery. I charged it last November, probably should give it a quick charge again. No time. I slide it into the shiny battery box, hook up the wires, turn on the key and hit the starter. Nothing. DANG IT! I go get the charger and hook it up to the battery. This is enough to make some lights come on, but not to turn it over. Later I went and picked the wife up from work. "I got a surprise for you when we get home!" She eyes me suspiciously. Back home I open the garage door, unhook the charger, turn on the key, say a prayer and hit the starter. She fired up first try. Oh sweet Jesus! And she hummed quietly, so quiet I doubt even my closest neighbor knew it was running.

The next morning it was sunny and warm again. With the wife off to work, I dug out my helmet, my new leather gloves, my old biker boots and my leather jacket. Hmm, funny. It must have shrunk while hanging in the closet all winter. I check the oil. Not a drop showing. What? Wait, am I supposed to stand it up when I check it? I stand it up and lean over to check it. Now the oil is to the top of the stick and beyond. Am I supposed to screw it in or not? Should have gotten that used Owner's Manual on EBay. Well, it seems to have plenty of oil. I check all the lights, brake lights, turn signals. Everything go! The tires need some air so I hop on (Stupid jacket! I can barely get it zipped! Breathe in, don't breathe out) and ride down to the corner QT. With suitable air, a fresh tank of premium fuel, and a quick look at the license plate (Whew! Still legal), I head off down highway 94. The old girl hums right along. Not a belch, not a ying or even a yang. It just ran... perfect. Ah spring. Maybe I'll put a new oversized carburetor on it. I mean, how hard could it be?

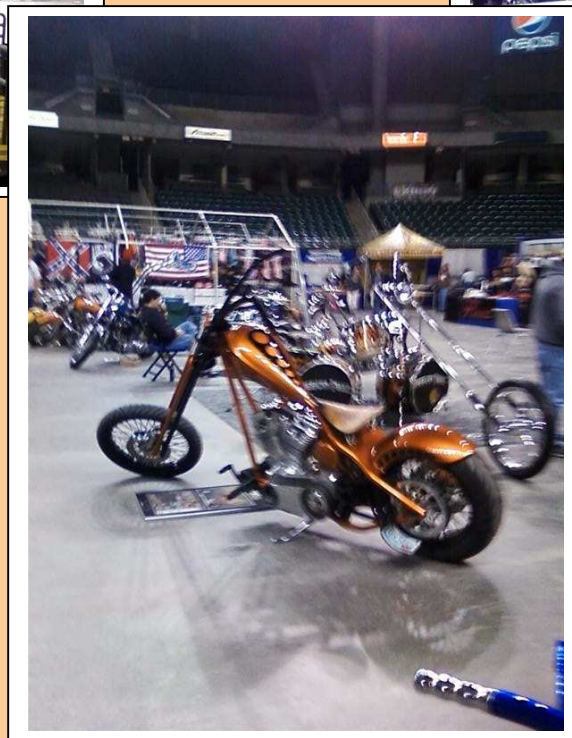
